Signs of Heat Exhaustion

- Skin Rash
- Heavy Sweating
- Feel Dizzy or Faint
- Feel Sick or Throw Up
- Rapid Breathing and Heartbeat

Headache

- Trouble Concentrating
- Muscle Cramps
- Extreme Thirst
- Dark Urine and Urinate Less

Anyone with these signs:

- Move to a cool space.
- Give plenty of water.

Signs of Heat Stroke

- High Body Temperature
- · Feel Dizzy or Faint
- · Less Coordinated
- · Very Hot and Red Skin

Anyone with these signs: Call 9-1-1

The best ways to prevent illness related to extreme heat:

Plan ahead

Cool Off

- Spend time in a cool space.
- ✓ Drink plenty of water.



 Plan outdoor activities for cooler times of the day so you avoid the

information and weather forecast.

Spend a few hours in a cool place

such as a tree-shaded area or an air-conditioned community centre.

Check the latest heat alert

Take breaks from the heat.

Dress for the heat

· Wear clothing that is loose-fitting, light-colored, and breathable.

Hydrate

- · Drink plenty of water.
- · Offer water often to those in your care.

Keep the space cool

- · Keep the building cool.
- · Close blinds to block the sun.
- · Open windows at night to let cooler air in.

Check-In

- · Notice how you feel.

July was first called Quintilis, meaning "fifth month." When Julius Caesar . changed the Roman calendar in 44 BC, adding January and February, July became the seventh month of the year. Following Caesar's assassination, Quintilis—the month in which he had been born— was renamed Julius (July) in his honor. However, the name change was not made official until four months later, when the appearance of a comet was taken to be a sign of Caesar's power.





Birthstone of the Month - Ruby

The ruby is one of the rarest gems in the world. It is revered by many cultures for its deep red color and prized by royalty the world over. These gorgeous stones represent love, invincibility, passion, and protection. Rubies are highly regarded in the Hindu religion; it is said that offering a ruby to Krishna guarantees reincarnation as an emperor or king.



Rubies mined in Burma are the most expensive gems per carat in the world.

Because of their superior crimson color, Burmese rubies are called "pigeon's blood."



Flower of the Month - Larkspur

July's flower, larkspur, has delicate blooms that come in a range of colors, including purple, pink, blue, and white. Larkspur's petals grow together and form a spur at the end, hence its name. The flower is a member of the delphinium family and can range in height from one to seven feet. Ancient uses for delphiniums included driving away scorpions. Early Americans used blue larkspur petals to make dye. The flowers symbolize love and affection. They also are said to convey a feeling of lightness or levity.
